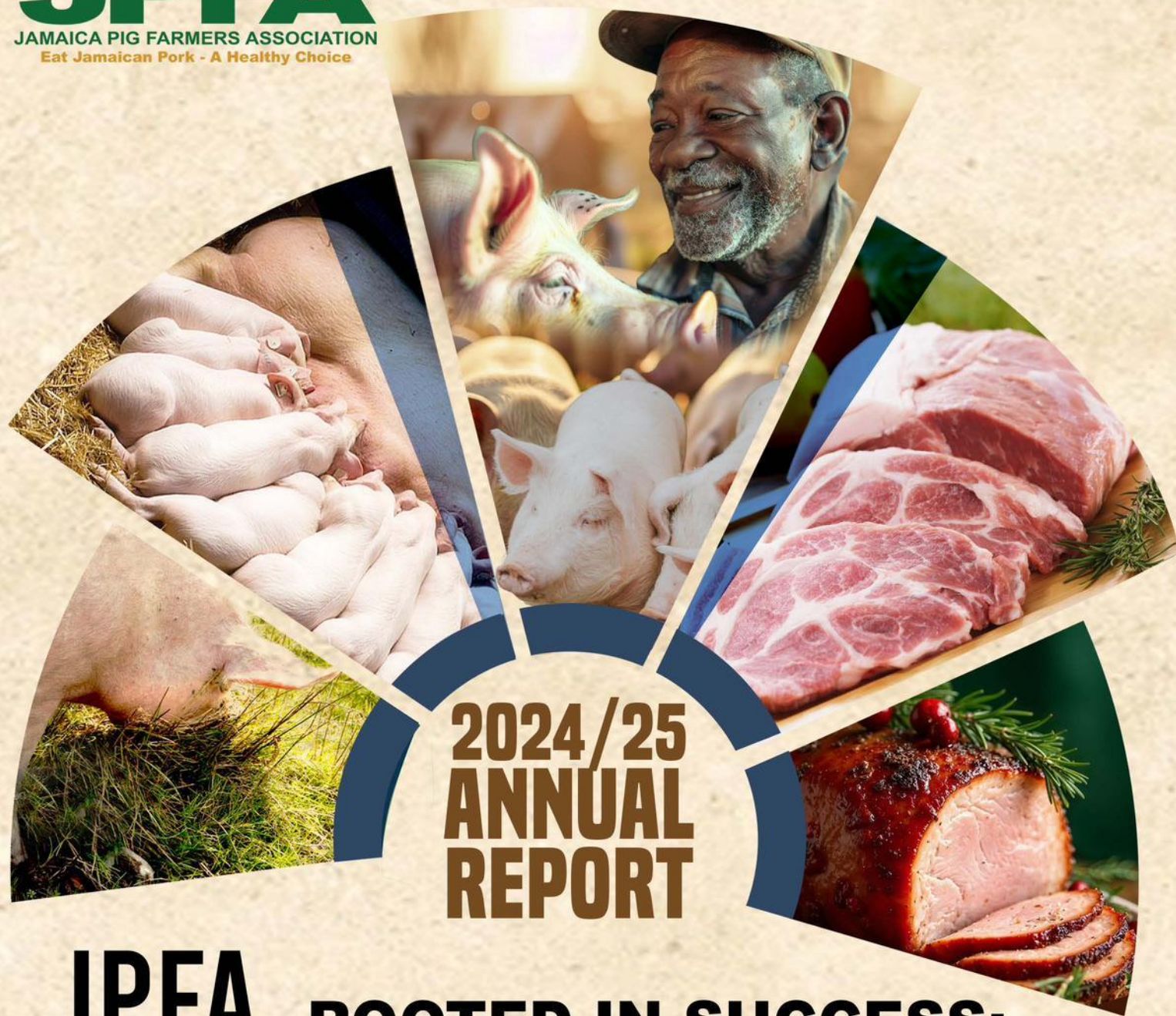

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MINUTES OF THE 22ND JAMAICA PIG FARMERS ASSOCIATION ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

St. John Bosco Vocational Institute, Hatfield Manchester | September 26, 2024

THEME: “SOW-ING THE SEEDS FOR GREATER PORK CONSUMPTION”

Welcome, Praise and Worship

The Annual General Meeting of the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association convened on Thursday, September 26, 2024, at the St. John Bosco Vocational Institute. The proceedings began with a session of praise and worship, led by Mr. Delroy Many, which set a reverent tone for the gathering.

Ascertainment of Quorum/Called to Order

Having ascertained quorum Mr. Brown called the meeting to order at 10:25 am. He noted that there were over 168 farmers registered, with two additional buses expected. He further noted that there were over 40 industry stakeholders and representatives from other entities present, and this would set the tone for a good meeting. He expressed his appreciation to the farmers for attending despite the inclement weather.

He noted that the agenda, as outlined in the Annual Report, would be followed as closely as possible.

Apologies

There were no apologies for lateness or absence.

Reading of Notice of AGM/Resolutions/Motions

Mr. Brown granted five minutes for attendees to review the minutes of the last Annual General

Meeting (AGM). Participants were encouraged to make note of any necessary modifications. No errors were identified, and a participant from the previous AGM was asked to confirm the minutes. Ms. Garnetta McIntosh approved the motion, which Ms. Selina Davidson seconded.

Reading, Correction and Confirmation of the Minutes

There were no matters arising from the minutes.

Acknowledgement and Recognition of AGM Sponsors

The chairperson acknowledged the contribution and participation of the meeting sponsors.

Each organization's representative was invited to offer opening remarks to the attendees.

Greetings from Affiliated Organizations

Representatives from the AGM partners were then invited to extend greetings to the attendees.

INTER-AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR CORPORATION ON AGRICULTURE (IICA) Mr. Kent Coipel - Country Representative

Mr. Coipel extended greetings on behalf of the Director General and staff of the IICA delegation



in Jamaica, expressing his recent yet strong connection to the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association (JPFA). He highlighted IICA's foundational role in supporting JPFA's development and proudly acknowledged its growth to approximately 1,800 members over 21 years, contributing significantly to the Jamaican economy by advancing the pork industry. He commended JPFA's efforts in improving local pork quality through capacity building, technology transfer, and enhanced stock quality. Mr. Coipel underscored the JPFA's objective to organize cooperatives and support small farmers, emphasizing the association's resilience and commitment to sustainability. He acknowledged JPFA's successful partnerships with the private sector, the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, and organizations like IICA, despite challenges such as biosecurity concerns and input price fluctuations.

Looking to the future, Mr. Coipel expressed optimism for the potential of JPFA's involvement in value-added pork products and encouraged the continued growth of the "Pork Jamaica" campaign. He reaffirmed IICA's support, particularly in raising awareness of African swine fever, sharing IICA's prepared video and inviting JPFA members to participate in regional workshops on the issue. Concluding, he extended heartfelt congratulations to the JPFA for its dedication and ongoing impact on its members and the agricultural sector, offering best wishes for continued success.

RURAL AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (RADA)

Ms. Maxine Brown - Senior Livestock Specialist

Ms. Brown in her greeting, expressed strong support for the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association (JPFA), emphasizing the theme "Sowing the

Seeds for Greater Pork Consumption" as fitting for this time, noting RADA's continued commitment to the pork industry's advancement. She highlighted RADA's role in providing training and coordination for production improvement, as well as advocating for funding on behalf of farmers. Through efforts with JSIF, RADA has secured water tanks and equipment packages for farmers, which include water boots, spray pans, and disinfectants to enhance biosecurity measures. Additionally, she encouraged farmers to adopt best practices now to ease future transitions, particularly in light of Jamaica's interest in regional exports. In response to recent hurricane damage, RADA has obtained funding for infrastructure repairs, and during the previous year's tropical storm, successfully lobbied the Ministry for \$8 million in aid, providing iron, feed, and other essential items.

Ms. Brown acknowledged the pork industry's crucial role in Jamaica's food security, with pork products supporting the hotel sector and contributing to the country's self-sufficiency. She urged JPFA members to continue pushing through challenges, lobby for needed improvements, and partner with RADA and the Ministry to expand the industry. In closing, she expressed appreciation for their dedication to production and reaffirmed RADA's commitment to a prosperous future for Jamaica's pig farmers.

JAMAICA AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY (JAS)

Mr. Owen Dobson - President

Mr. Owen Dobson conveyed greetings on behalf of the Jamaica Agricultural Society (JAS) to President Brown, the executive, distinguished guests, business partners, and the farmers in attendance, acknowledging the vital role of pig farmers in making the meeting possible. He shared his background as a longstanding pig



farmer from Westmoreland and expressed pride in representing both himself and the JAS in his role.

Mr. Dobson emphasized JAS's commitment to supporting the Pig Farmers Association, with Mr. Brown serving as a representative on the executive board. Acknowledging recent challenges faced by farmers, particularly the difficulty of selling livestock after significant investments in feed, Mr. Dobson reassured attendees that he had discussed these concerns with the Permanent Secretary, who is actively seeking solutions. He affirmed that JAS, under his leadership, would continue to lobby and advocate for the interests of pig farmers, especially as the sector prepares for the holiday season. In closing, he expressed gratitude for the opportunity to be present and pledged ongoing support to the association.

CARIBBEAN PRODUCERS JAMAICA (CPJ)

Mr. Chris-Anthony Salter - Commercial Manager

Mr. Chris-Anthony Salter expressed gratitude for the opportunity to address the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association (JPFA) Annual General Meeting, acknowledging the importance of the theme "Sowing the Seeds for Greater Pork Consumption." He noted that Caribbean Producers Jamaica Limited (CPJ) fully supports this vision, as CPJ has partnered with JPFA and the farming community for nearly 20 years, sharing the goal of advancing pork consumption and industry standards. Salter highlighted a trend toward smaller ham sizes (4-5 kg) to meet consumer demand for affordable options, which CPJ sees as an opportunity to expand reach while maintaining quality.

He reaffirmed CPJ's commitment to supporting Jamaica's pig farmers through sourcing, marketing, and distribution strategies, aiming to raise awareness about the nutritional value, versatility, and pride associated with Jamaican pork. CPJ remains dedicated to this partnership,

from developing new products, like Jerk ham, to enhancing market access. Salter closed by expressing confidence that the shared efforts of CPJ and JPFA would drive the growth of pork consumption and elevate Jamaica's agricultural sector.

NUTRAMIX

Dr. Patrick Craig - Veterinarian

Dr. Patrick Craig reiterated Nutramix and the Government's steadfast support for the JPFA and Jamaica's pig farmers, emphasizing Nutramix's commitment to boosting the local pork industry. Representing the Caribbean Broilers Group (CBG), Nutramix Limited, Nutramix Pig Feed, and Copperwood Farms, Dr. Craig highlighted recent strides, including a shift in processing operations. By moving CBG's chicken processing to a new Spanish Town facility, the group has reallocated Kingston facilities to focus on pork processing, which has increased the weekly capacity from 450 to 590 pigs, with a goal of reaching 600 pigs per week. This strategic expansion will require sourcing an additional 400 pigs monthly from local farmers, directly supporting the growth and income of the farming community.

Beyond processing, CBG is dedicated to empowering farmers with knowledge, resources, and professional guidance. The company recently increased its veterinary staff to four and added new livestock support specialists, who provide free, on-site assistance to farmers throughout Jamaica, sometimes even on weekends. Dr. Craig emphasized CBG's "trifecta" approach to supporting farmers, offering high-quality Nutramix feed, premium genetics, and hands-on training in best farming practices. This comprehensive model aims to ensure that farmers have access to the resources and knowledge needed to maximize production quality and efficiency.



In addition, CBG is working to formalize its relationships with farmers by transitioning from verbal agreements to written contracts. These contracts secure a reliable market for farmers and provide the credibility needed to access financial loans for expansion. Dr. Craig emphasized CBG's commitment to a mutually beneficial partnership, expressing that the organization aims to put its promises into action by ensuring fair, documented agreements. With these efforts, CBG reaffirmed its dedication to fostering a prosperous, sustainable future for Jamaican pig farmers and contributing to the broader goal of strengthening Jamaica's agricultural sector.

HI-PRO

**Col. (Ret'd) Jaimie Ogilvie, OD,
JP - Vice President**

Colonel Jaimie Ogilvie praised the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association (JPFA) for its unity and dedication to advancing Jamaica's pig farming sector, acknowledging the leadership and energy brought by the executive team. He recognized the resilience of pig farmers who, despite numerous challenges such as policy shifts, natural disasters, and the COVID-19 pandemic, have continued to produce high-quality pork for Jamaican consumers. Mr. Ogilvie called for unwavering support from all stakeholders to prioritize locally-produced pork over imports, emphasizing that pig farmers are essential to Jamaica's goal of food independence, rather than just food security.

He underscored Hi-Pro's commitment to farmers, especially in light of the seasonal demand increase. As Christmas approaches, he encouraged farmers to optimize production, ensuring that supply meets consumer demand, and to encourage local businesses and restaurants to place their pork orders early. He expressed gratitude to the Ministry for its prompt response following Hurricane Beryl

and urged continued collaboration to maintain favorable policies, particularly import restrictions that protect local farmers.

Looking ahead, Mr. Ogilvie stressed the need for long-term planning to double pork consumption in Jamaica, which currently stands at 4.3 kg per capita, by keeping sows, improving genetics, and aligning production with anticipated demand growth. Hi-Pro, he assured, remains a steadfast partner, with its team ready to provide farmers with veterinary support, technical expertise, and effective solutions, further solidifying its role in the success and growth of the pig farming industry.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The President instead of presenting his formal report, directed everyone to the report that was included in the AGM registration packet (pages 20-22), Mr. Brown utilized the opportunity to outline other issues. Members were allowed to pose questions at the end of his presentation.

President Hanif Brown provided a comprehensive report on the past 12 months, referencing the strategic progress made by the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association (JPFA) since the previous AGM. His report spanned pages 20-22 in the meeting booklet and outlined the achievements, challenges, and strategic goals under a multi-year plan designed to improve the pig farming industry. Brown emphasized the JPFA's enhanced efforts over the past year, attributing success to increased sponsorship from feed companies and other stakeholders. He explained that the association's funding largely derives from a portion of each pig feed purchase, which enables the JPFA to implement essential initiatives for its members.

He highlighted the importance of collective action among pig farmers and stakeholders, stating that



cooperation is essential for achieving the JPFA's objectives. In November, JPFA launched the "Pork Jamaica Marketing Campaign" to stimulate local pork consumption. Brown noted that over the past two decades, production has steadily increased, allowing farmers to transition from scarcity to periods of oversupply. The campaign's goal is to double per capita pork consumption from 4 to 7 kilograms by 2026, which would increase market demand for farmers' products. This campaign involved television, radio, social media, and partnerships with restaurants, particularly in Kingston, to promote "pork-specific" menu days, encouraging the Jamaican public to choose pork as an affordable, tasty protein source.

Brown urged farmers to adopt best practices to build consumer confidence in pork as a primary protein choice, mentioning the campaign's slogan: "Pork Jamaica, the tastier protein choice." He announced an upcoming televised advertisement on TVJ, set for release in November, coinciding with the campaign's first anniversary. Support from prominent industry partners like CPJ and Copperwood and government entities further bolstered campaign efforts.

In addressing member engagement, Brown observed an increase in attendance due to the JPFA's extensive training initiatives. Six training seminars, held in collaboration with RADA, Hi-Pro, Nutramix, Baruch, and the Ministry of Health and Wellness, reached farmers across all parishes, focusing on record-keeping and biosecurity to ensure better farm management and disease prevention.

On biosecurity, he expressed concerns about the nearby threat of African Swine Fever in the Dominican Republic. The association has

intensified efforts to educate farmers on biosecurity practices to protect livestock. Additionally, informational videos are being developed to provide farmers with easy access to best practices. Brown also commended industry partners for their veterinary services, offered at no cost to farmers, and encouraged members to take advantage of these resources. He clarified that the JPFA's role is to support pig farmers with production knowledge and market guidance, rather than direct sales.

Significantly, the JPFA had several meetings with the Ministry of Agriculture, fostering industry-wide collaboration to address supply, market demands, and other sectoral needs. Brown addressed a recent issue involving unauthorized pork imports, confirming that illegal imports had briefly affected local sales but reassuring members of ongoing government and customs efforts to mitigate such occurrences.

In light of the industry's challenges, Brown praised JPFA's post-Hurricane Beryl relief efforts. The association collaborated with RADA, Hi-Pro, Nutramix, and others to provide affected farmers in the southern and western parishes with essential supplies, including feed, water tanks, and farm materials.

Looking forward, Brown announced the establishment of a JPFA disaster fund to provide faster relief in future emergencies. This fund will allocate 5% of revenue from pig feed cess collections to aid farmers in times of crisis.

The report concluded with an update on the planned pig industry survey, a census designed to gather critical industry data. Although delayed due to funding constraints, the survey will proceed with Ministry of Agriculture support, capturing detailed



farm information to guide future industry strategies and bolster campaigns like Pork Jamaica.

President Brown extended his gratitude to the board, staff, and industry partners, encouraging members to engage with the association actively, report issues, and support collaborative growth. He urged detractors to unify with the JPFA's mission, reaffirming the association's commitment to advancing the interests of Jamaican pig farmers. Following the president's report, there was a segment for questions and answers which proceeded as follows:

Q: **MR. LOCKSLEY LAING:** "I'm having a hard time finding a market for my pigs and can't afford to keep feeding them; some buyers promised to purchase, and I sold 10 pigs, but I haven't received any payment. If there's any assistance available, I'd really appreciate it, as the situation is getting increasingly difficult to manage."

A: **MR. BROWN:** "Well, I see that as soon as I start talking, every table here lights up, and I get it—every farmer here, myself included, is dealing with the same problem this year: we just can't sell the quantities we want. I've had to cut back production myself; I can't just wean and go back to stud without knowing where the market is. Pig farming is a business, and if you're going to increase production, you need to know your buyers ahead of time because there's a huge risk in expanding without a guaranteed market. The Association doesn't buy pigs, and too many farmers are relying on brokers who pay below cost, which only creates losses. My advice is simple: secure contracts, know your demand, and be ready to invest in meeting the high standards for sectors like tourism, which involve tracking, record-keeping, and ensuring quality".

Q: **DAMIAN BALCOMBE:** "I think we are having all of these problems because there is no regulation. Can some regulation be put in place for us?"

A: **MR. BROWN:** "So let me remind everybody first on foremost. Regarding the regulation for growing pigs, the only regulation that we, the association, is pushing for is regulation as to minimum standard. The minimum standards that are being created for pig farming, is centered around safe pork".

Q: **NICOLE BROWN:** "I was supposed to get a grant that was being offered to farmers, but unfortunately, it fell through the cracks. How can we get our benefits as farmers that we deserve?"

A: **MR. BROWN:** "Please give the name of that officer who was to look about the grant for you, to Ms. Larson so she can do further investigations to find out what really happened".

Q: **WILBERT FOSTER:** "Are you telling us as our President, that there is no guarantee in raising pigs or getting them sold?"

A: **MR. BROWN:** "The only way in any business that you can know if that end-product is going to be sold is by doing your research. As your association, we are trying our utmost best to see how we can get the markets and consumption increased, because that's the only way we believe that the market share will increase".

Q: **JAVIAN BASSIER:** "I've checked the website to purchase goods but it's been six months now and I'm not seeing any profits. How much returns and profit are there when you go into pig farming. It's as if I'm wasting my time. All the prices on the website are so high. I can't see



where I'll make a return on my investment".

A: MR. BROWN: "The JPFA cannot put a specific rate of return on pig return. The reason for that is that expenses vary on every single farm. If you don't have proper genetics, at least an acceptable husbandry, a proper feeding program, you can't make any money".

The president concluded the segment by thanking the members for their questions and contributions.

Financial Report

On behalf of the Association's Treasurer, Mr. Brown sought to summarize the audited financial report for December 31, 2023. Mr. Brown presented an overview of the Association's financial progress over the year ending December 31, 2023. Contributions increased from \$14.7 million in 2022 to \$20 million, reflecting a 30% rise attributed to higher cess collections on pig feed, indicating elevated production levels. Administrative costs also rose, reaching \$13.9 million due to strategic investments, particularly the pork campaign launched in November 2022, which accounted for \$5.8 million in expenses.

The Association's net assets grew significantly, climbing from \$17.4 million to \$24 million, showcasing responsible management and strong financial health. Fixed deposits from prior COVID-related savings bolstered the assets, earmarked for upcoming projects such as surveys, campaigns, and farmer training initiatives to further support the sector.

Mr. Brown reassured members that the Association is committed to prudent financial stewardship, demonstrating transparency and planning for sustainable growth. He invited members to review the report in detail and is prepared to answer questions on specific line items for clarity and transparency.

DEVELOPMENT BANK OF JAMAICA: MR. JASON FERGUSON - DEVELOPMENT EXECUTIVE

Mr. Jason Ferguson presented an overview of the Development Bank of Jamaica (DBJ), clarifying its role in supporting innovation and job creation, particularly for farmers and small entrepreneurs. DBJ provides various funding options, including grants for those unable to secure loans, capacity grants for business growth, and training programs to enhance business skills. Additionally, DBJ collaborates with commercial banks, credit unions, and investment houses to offer low-interest loans through these intermediaries. Entrepreneurs with promising ideas can receive grants ranging from JMD\$3 million for start-up ventures to up to JMD\$20 million for market-ready businesses. DBJ also offers credit guarantees, assisting clients in securing necessary collateral for loans, thereby facilitating easier access to funding for business expansion.

KEY-NOTE ADDRESS: MS. MAXINE BROWN ON BEHALF OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE, FLOYD GREEN

Ms. Brown, on behalf of Minister Floyd Green, affirmed the Ministry of Agriculture's commitment to the growth of Jamaica's pig industry, highlighting its importance for local farmers, food security, and economic growth. Minister Green noted that pork production increased by approximately 10% over the past five years, and to sustain this progress, the Ministry has limited pork imports to safeguard local farmers' market share. In collaboration with the Jamaica Pig Farmers Association, the Ministry has also launched the "Pork Jamaica" campaign to boost local pork consumption, aiming to increase per capita pork consumption to 8 kilograms within five years, which would align Jamaica with regional standards.

The Ministry introduced several initiatives to support pig farmers, including removing the



General Consumption Tax on live pig imports to improve breed diversity, investing \$433.5 million in a modern piggery unit for superior genetics, and providing funding and resources to mitigate climate impacts. The Minister also announced ongoing training programs through the Rural Agricultural Development Authority, support for farm sanitation, and collaboration with the Jamaica Social Investment Fund to supply essential farm materials. The Minister emphasized the need for an updated industry census to guide future policies, urging collaboration among all stakeholders to enhance farm management practices and contribute to a sustainable and thriving pig industry. The Ministry is dedicated to this cause and looks forward to achieving the sector's full potential with collective efforts.

The Chairman thanked Ms. Brown and asked her to relay thanks to the Minister for his unwavering support to the pig farmers and the industry on a whole.

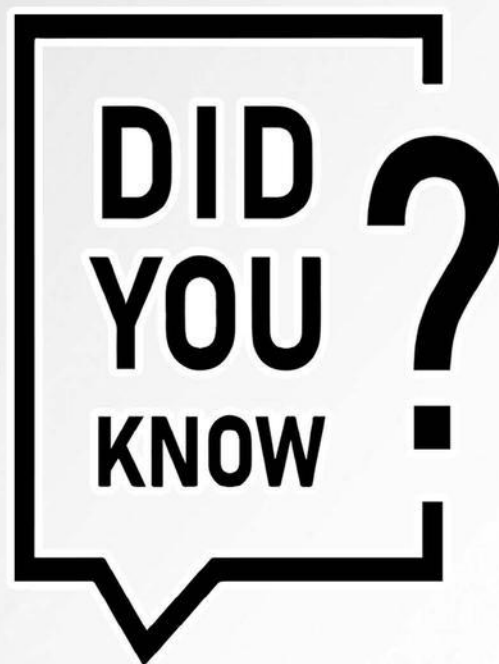

THE *President/ Executive Committee Report*

PRESENTED BY

OCTOBER 2024 - SEPTEMBER 2025

On behalf of the Executive Board of the Jamaica Pig Farmers' Association, I am pleased to present the President's Report covering the period October 2024 to September 2025. This year has been marked by significant challenges. The continued risk posed by illegal pork imports and the widespread destruction of farm infrastructure caused by Hurricane Beryl are just a few. However there have been notable successes in marketing, training, and farmer resilience.

Our collective efforts have strengthened the industry as we continued our advocacy and promoted the growth and sustainability of pig farming and an increase in the consumption of pork.

THE PORK JAMAICA CAMPAIGN

The Pork Jamaica campaign remained central to our outreach and marketing strategy. The campaign has been promoting local pork as the preferred protein choice for Jamaican households, restaurants, and processors.

- **Reach & Impact:** Through radio and social media, the campaign has reached thousands of Jamaicans, with the strongest engagement among consumers aged 25-44, who represent the fastest-growing demographic for pork consumption.

- **Market Response:** Based on feedback from

retailers and butchers, sales of locally produced pork have increased. Since the second quarter of this year, we have seen our major processors increasing their weekly slaughter numbers.

We are currently awaiting data from the Ministry of Health relating to the number of pigs slaughtered for the period Jan-June 2025 so that there can be an analytical comparison with the data for the respective period in 2024.

- **Brand Advancement:** The campaign's slogan, "Pork Jamaica: the tastier protein choice," has gained strong recognition, with many restaurants now adding more pork to their menu. We have seen more pork products being offered by our processors with the inclusion of pork burgers.

The campaign will continue to evolve in 2026 with more emphasis being placed on digital marketing, consumer education, and building partnerships with foodservice providers.

LOBBYING & ADVOCACY

Illegal importation of pork remains a serious threat to the viability of our farmers. This year, the Association intensified its lobbying efforts with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Mining and the Jamaica Customs Department.

The JPFA participated in two policy meetings and highlighted the financial losses faced by our farmers due to unchecked illegal imports. The Customs department has since reported that there has been an increase in inspections at key ports, and that numerous inspections were carried out at cold storage facilities, however

we continue to advocate stronger penalties for offenders and for more resources to be allocated for inspections.

TRAINING & FARMER DEVELOPMENT



Farmer education remains critical to improving productivity and profitability. Between February and May 2025, the JPFA, in collaboration with Nutramix, HiPro and RADA, conducted nine training sessions across the island.

- Participation: Over 530 farmers attended these sessions, with strong representation from Westmoreland, Manchester, St. Catherine, and St. Elizabeth, which together account for 65% of national pork production.
- Focus Areas were:
 - o Best practices in pig nutrition, genetics and housing
 - o Financial management for profitable pig farming
 - o Disease prevention and treatment
 - o Biosecurity

Given the regional threats posed by African Swine Fever (ASF), greater emphasis was placed on biosecurity measures this year. Farmers were trained in:

- Controlled farm entry protocols
- Proper disposal of carcasses
- Quarantine procedures for sick animals
- Sanitation and equipment sterilization

Post-Hurricane Beryl Relief

Hurricane Beryl in July 2024 caused severe disruptions across farming communities.

The JPFA, working with RADA, the Ministry of Agriculture, and private sector partners, coordinated relief for over 50 affected farmers.

- Distributed Items:
 - o 200 bags of feed
 - o 10 water tanks
 - o 120 water nipples
 - o Veterinary medicines and disinfectants

This swift response helped to stabilize pig herds, prevent widespread losses, and supported farmers' recovery efforts.

PARTNERSHIPS & COLLABORATION

The Association continues to strengthen its collaboration with RADA, research institutions, and private stakeholders. Joint initiatives have improved extension services, data collection, and access to financing for small and medium-scale farmers.

WORLD PORK EXPO 2025

In my capacity as President of the JPFA, I was sponsored by HiPro to attend the World Pork Expo in Des Moines, Iowa, USA, from June 4-5 2025.



This Expo attracts over 10,000 producers and Industry professionals from roughly 32 countries. It afforded me the opportunity to attend Seminars and workshops covering topics on bio security, swine health and feed efficiency. The Expo also provided avenues for networking, exposure to advance swine production practices and genetics which I will be able to share with members and use for the benefit of the JPFA.



DENBIGH AGRICULTURAL SHOW

The JPFA participated in the 2025 Denbigh Agricultural Show as part of its ongoing mission to promote local pork production, enhance industry standards and build stronger market linkages.



This year we partnered with three stakeholders, HiPro, Nations Choice and AIC. These partnerships were aimed at strengthening visibility and public engagement.

The booth at HiPro provided informational brochures and interactive question and answer sessions particularly focused on best practices for small and medium sized pig farmers.

We collaborated with Nations Choice to promote its new jerk pork burgers and to pair sweet potatoes fries provided by AIC as an accompaniment to the pork burgers and other pork products. Visitors were able to sample these new offerings which received positive feedback signaling promising opportunities for growth in the sector.

LOOKING AHEAD

As we prepare for the next year, our priorities will be to expand the "Pork Jamaica" campaign into schools and restaurants to build long-term consumer loyalty and to strengthen our policy advocacy to eliminate illegal pork imports and ensure fair market conditions.

We will be increasing our training opportunities, with a special focus on youth and women farmers, who now make up 40% of our new members.

The past year has demonstrated the resilience and determination of Jamaican pig farmers. Despite numerous challenges, we have continued to strengthen our Association, ensuring that pork production remains a vital and profitable component of the agricultural sector. I extend my sincere commendation to all our members for their dedication and express deep gratitude to our partners for their unwavering support.

Together, we will continue to ensure that Jamaican pork remains the consumer's preferred protein choice - fresh, clean, safe and proudly local.

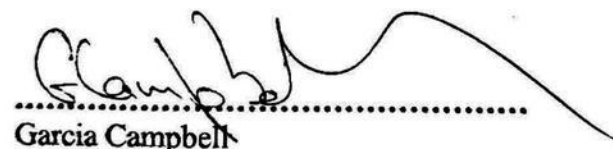

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP NOMINATION RESPONSIBILITY

IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT THE GENERAL MEMBERSHIP BE REMINDED THAT IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO NOMINATE ANY REGISTERED MEMBER OF THE JPFA (DURING THE TIME NOMINATIONS ARE TAKEN FROM THE FLOOR), WHO YOU KNOW CAN REPRESENT THE ASSOCIATION'S BEST INTEREST.

- I. NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOMINATIONS PROPOSED BY THE NOMINATIONS COMMITTEE, NOMINATIONS ARE OPEN TO ALL REGISTERED, JPFA MEMBERS.
- II. REGISTERED JPFA MEMBERS ARE BEING ADVISED THAT THEY ARE FREE TO NOMINATE A CANDIDATE FOR ANY AND EVERY POSITION THEY SO CHOOSE, FOR THE POSITION OF PRESIDENT AND TREASURER THE NOMINEE MUST HAVE SERVED ON THE BOARD FOR AT LEAST ONE YEAR.
- III. FOR A NOMINATION TO BE ACCEPTED BY THE ELECTORAL OFFICER IT MUST BE MOVED AND SECONDED BY TWO SEPARATE JPFA MEMBERS.
2. The Director of Elections for the 2025/2026 voting on Resolutions and other such scenarios is Mr. Ainsworth Riley
3. Votes are cast by all Delegates (registered members of the JPFA, referred to as the General Membership).
4. Votes are cast when each General Member indicates by raising one of his/her hands high in the air to show when he/she is in favor of (or against) a particular position being voted on.





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5. Each delegate will only be allowed to vote once per scenario being voted on (that is delegate can only vote either FOR or AGAINST a particular scenario).
6. The scenario or person with the highest (or at least a simple majority of one vote) over the other scenario (s) and/or person (s) will be declared the WINNER.
7. In the event there is a tie (equal number of votes for either scenario and/or person voted on) the Director of Elections will break the deadlock by casting the deciding vote for favour of a WINNER.

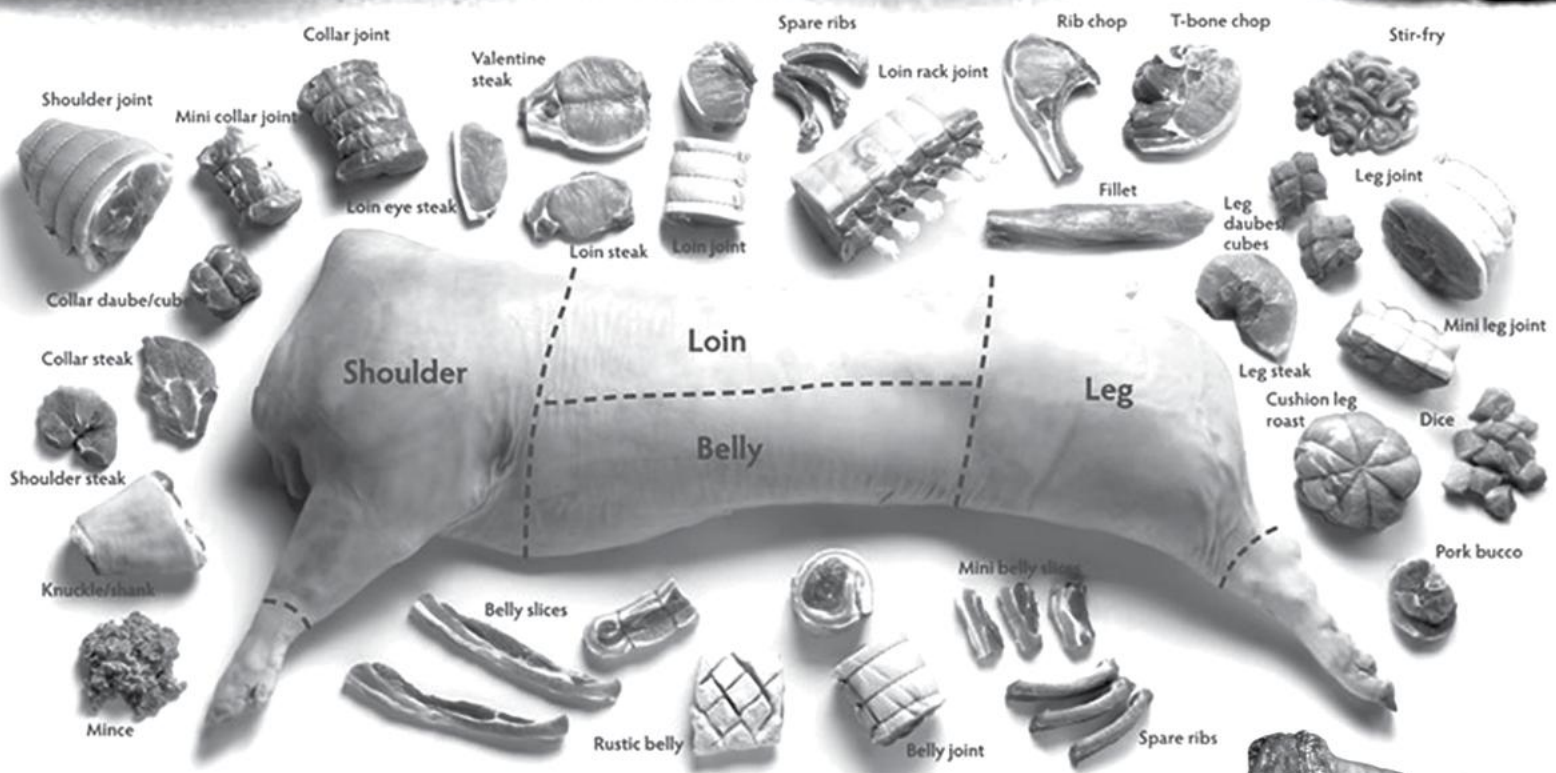

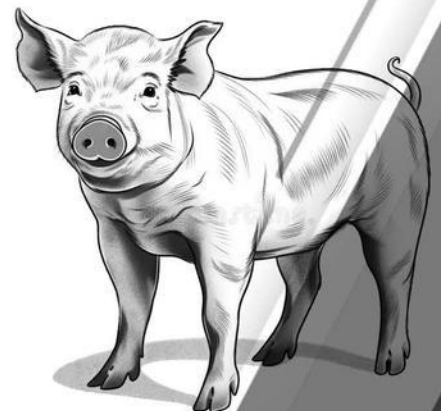
